We sent out a letter via email last week to pastors and clerks from Don Makin, our Interim GP, reflecting on his first few months on the job. If you missed it, you can...



Job notice



Peaks Grants in Action: The Bible in Black and White



Through a Church Partnership grant, Peaks Presbytery offered support for the Fall 2025 Bible in Black and White study. The study is held at Second Presbyterian and sponsored by a diverse group of area churches: Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, High Street Baptist Church, Hill Street Baptist Church, Loudon Ave Christian Church, Raleigh Court Presbyterian Church, Second Presbyterian Church, St. John's Episcopal Church. Around 70 people attended the lunch provided by the presbytery, followed by a study of passages in the Gospel of John.

Earth Care

At Blacksburg Presbyterian Church's garden, the leaves and stalks stay all winter.

Our Creation Care garden, first planted in 2015 with milkweed for



monarchs, has since expanded to 28 Virginia native plant species or cultivars of native species, in addition to 6 or 7 other non-native species that were in the garden when we started it.

The garden is there to showcase easy-to-grow native species, to attract pollinators, and to provide food and shelter for wildlife. To fulfill that mission, we leave the stalks and leaves through the winter, rather than cleaning up in fall. That

helps things like native bees that overwinter in the dead plant stems; butterflies that overwinter in the leaf litter as adults, chrysalises or caterpillars; ladybug larvae that hide under rocks or leaves; and birds that feast on these hibernating insects or on the seeds and berries of the dormant plants in order to survive the winter cold.

In front of the garden, we have placed a sign with a QR code that provides more information. The QR code sends you to this website which explains why we leave our garden beds "untidied"
