- Upcoming Events: We're planning a Presbytery wide event for August!

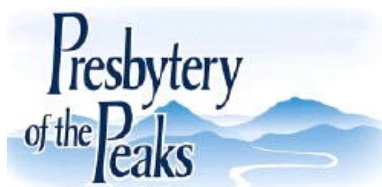
For those serving as first-time commissioners, we invite you to participate in the training prior to the start of the meeting, led by our Stated Clerk, Dave Baker.

## BILLS AND OVERTURES SUBCOMMITTEE REPORT (Constitutional Ministries Committee)

### INFORMATION:

1. Rev. Sarah Willes, Blacksburg Presbyterian Church requested the Bills and Overtures Subcommittee review 3 overtures coming to the 228<sup>th</sup> General Assembly and present them to the Presbytery at the February 21, 2026 meeting for concurrence.

### ACTION:

1. The Bills and Overtures subcommittee met on February 5, 2026 and recommends the Presbytery concur with the overture for *The Green Future Endowment Fund*.  
 2. The Bills and Overture subcommittee does not recommend the Presbytery concur the *Changing Course for a Green Future* overture or *On the Importance of Regenerative Farming Practices in Caring for Creation* overture. Rationale from the subcommittee is included with each overture.

### Overture 1: The Green Future Endowment Fund

**Overture :** This Overture asks the church to establish a permanent endowment fund from which to make grants to support a just transition to renewable energy and projects of repair for damage caused by environmental injustice. This would be a two-step process with the decision to establish the fund occurring at this Assembly along with establishing a design team to work over the following two years to develop a proposal for how the fund would be capitalized and operated and bring this proposal to the following Assembly for action.

**Rationale:** For many decades, the church has confessed its failure to live up to its values and pronouncements related to earth care. In its adoption of the recommendations in the “Investing in a Green Future” position paper during the 225<sup>th</sup> General Assembly in 2022, the linkage was made between addressing climate change and economic and racial justice -- what many refer to as the “just transition” from our current fossil fuels based economic order to one based in renewable energy sources. In its call for a re-doubling of the church’s efforts to address climate change, in a just and differentiated manner, this document recognized the need for the church to fund such efforts, while also re-aligning our investments with these values.

The Green Future Endowment Fund would be a means for addressing these areas of concern, far into the future, as the planet continues to warm and devastating weather events destroy homes, churches and wildlife habitat. While the scope and amount of this fund’s resources are yet to be determined, this overture calls on the 227<sup>th</sup> General Assembly to take the first step toward its establishment.

**Background:**

The 218th Assembly in 2008 recommended that a fund be established in the Restoring Creation ministry area of the denomination’s program agency to be used to assist congregations with the green transition which was never done. The 225<sup>th</sup> G.A. affirmed the “polluter pays” principle and called for the church to align its treasure with its values. An honest appraisal of the history of our own denomination’s investment earnings will lead to the realization that much of this has resulted from business practices and products which have damaged the planet and vulnerable communities in many ways. In other words, the needs to financially support funds for the green transition, adaptation, and loss and damage are not simple charity but in some degree reparation for harms caused by the very companies from whose practices and products we have profited.

### **Bills and Overtures Subcommittee Response:**

**We support this overture. A recommendation was made in 2008 to establish a fund for Restoring Creation ministry but was never acted on. These funds would help churches facing damage from natural disasters which are occurring more frequently. This overture would establish a team to begin the process of creating a proposal to bring to the next General Assembly.**

**Overture** :This overture asks the church to become a leader in the global transition to renewable energy by withdrawing from our financial investments in the polluting production and use of fossil fuels because this more faithfully accords with the reality of climate science, the guidance and policy of previous General Assemblies and our witness to God's justice, care and hope for creation.

**Rationale:** Our denomination has long affirmed that caring for creation is central to our discipleship and public witness and this includes the need to teach and to practice that which will meet the Genesis mandate to be caretakers of the Earth.

The 226<sup>th</sup> GA in 2024, recommitted the denomination to the urgent need to align our programs with the global efforts to transition away from fossil fuels in a just, orderly and equitable manner and increase this effort in the current decade.

This overture seeks to bring the church's financial practices into alignment with the commitments we have already made and to reflect the urgency of cutting our carbon emissions by 2030 to avoid temperatures that will be catastrophic for all life.

**Background:**

Since 2014, tens of Presbyteries across the PC(USA) representing hundreds of thousands of church members have sent overtures to every General Assembly calling for the church to stand in solidarity with creation and the poor who increasingly suffer from natural disasters and species loss resulting from fossil fueled climate change. These overtures have called for a complete divestment of our denominational stock holdings in companies which extract, produce, transport and market fossil fuels. The 226<sup>th</sup> G.A. approved the last of these and then reversed itself, choosing, instead, to reduce this call to only ten such companies. According to our most reliable information, the Presbyterian Foundation and Board of Pensions still holds up to one hundred and forty million dollars or so in fossil fuel investments. This overture is now calling for the removal of the remainder of our holdings. Having already removed over one hundred million from the fossil fuel market over the last six years in accordance with prior G.A. actions and shifting market dynamics, it is clear that the request of this overture is implementable.

**Bills and Overtures Subcommittee Response:**

**We do not recommend the Presbytery concur with this overture. No line in the Book of Order says anything about investing in these companies. Implementing this overture would be financially complicated and would tie the hands of those making financial decisions for our denomination. The biggest issue we have is bringing back the same overtures year after year. A decision was made at the 226<sup>th</sup> General Assembly regarding this matter and we respect the decisions of the General Assembly's that have gone before us.**

**Overture 3: On the Importance of Regenerative Farming Practices in Caring for Creation**

It is the same text as first adopted by the Presbytery of Cayuga-Syracuse Presbytery at their meeting on January 21<sup>st</sup>, 2026. If concurred with by our Presbytery, it must be received by the Office of General Assembly on or before May 7, 2026.

In order to meet that deadline, we are asking for it to be on the agenda for the (date of meeting) and adequate time allocated for discussion. (Name of person from your church or Minister sponsor) will attend to present it and answer any questions.

What follows is a brief summary of the content, rationale and background of this overture.

**Overture:** This overture calls for Presbyterians to learn about and support regenerative farming practices; it directs the Office of Public Witness to advocate with the U.S. government and the Hunger Program to equip Presbyterians with necessary knowledge; it encourages Presbyterians and congregations to act upon this knowledge in their own gardening and farming activities, to pursue farming as a vocation, and to advocate in local, state and national spheres for policy changes which will strengthen the regenerative farming movement and enable more people of color to own farmland and operate farms using regenerative farming practices.

**Rationale Summary:** World food supplies depend upon improving the condition of soils worldwide, which have deteriorated under excessive use of tillage, chemical fertilizers, and pesticides. Modern science tells us that regenerative farming practices can build sustainable soil and enhance the nutritional benefits of food, while decreasing costs of inputs for farmers. But government policies and farming culture are slow to support adoption of these better practices at sufficient scale. These farming practices can enable more farmers to stay on their lands, enabling economic resurgence of rural communities, and that can provide careers for young people who face insecurities in an age of robots and artificial intelligence. Regenerated soil can sequester more carbon, helping to slow climate change, and it can store water for timely use by green plants, reducing the severity of both floods and droughts. As people of faith who honor Christ’s teachings to feed the poor, people and institutions of PCUSA can help in discernment and implementation of scientific information that makes it possible to meet this responsibility.

**Background:** The 221<sup>st</sup> (2014) General Assembly enacted the “Food Sovereignty for All” Overture, which envisioned affordable and healthy food, grown sustainably as the most faithful means for fulfilling the biblical mandate to ensure that people are fed. Regenerative farming practices were lifted up in the ACSWP policy document: “Investing in a Green Future: A Vision for A Renewed Creation,” which was adopted by the 225<sup>th</sup> (2022) General Assembly.

**Bills and Overtures Subcommittee Response:**

**We do not recommend that the Presbytery concur with this overture. The goal is well-intended but the PC(USA) Office of Public Witness is not the best resource to “equip Presbyterians with necessary knowledge” about best farming practices. Small, sustainable, generational farmers who have cultivated expertise in healthy agricultural development are better resources. More importantly, they are already located within some of the churches of our presbytery.**

## REPORT OF THE JUSTICE AND MERCY COMMISSION

### INFORMATION:

#### Updates from the Subcommittees

##### **Abukloi Subcommittee:**

God continues to work in and through the Presbytery of the Peaks as we partner with the Abukloi Foundation to support education in South Sudan. In January, the endowment arm of Raleigh Court Presbyterian Church approved a grant for \$22,705. The grant project entails installing a solar-powered water pump, a water tank, and a tower, along with a gravity-fed irrigation system. A solar-powered irrigation system significantly lessens the effort required to operate a hand water pump and carry watering cans to each vegetable bed. It will also ensure consistent watering, leading to a better harvest. Maximizing the garden's productivity can provide food for the families working there and help supplement Abukloi School's meal program.

Additionally, the land next to the garden, also owned by Abukloi Foundation, is being developed into a Technical and Vocational Education Training program. The garden will eventually serve as a practical lab for students to enhance their agricultural skills and learn plumbing and mechanical maintenance by caring for the irrigation system. Congregations and individuals throughout the presbytery are funding education for students at the Abukloi Secondary School through sponsorships. As of the end of January, twenty student sponsorships have been paid with five pending renewals. If you are interested in sponsoring a student, the cost for a year is \$960 and can be paid with a one-time payment or recurring payments through the website. Please note, if you use the website payment vs. a check, DO NOT agree to pay a fee if asked. The fee is optional, but a requirement of the hosting site. If a smaller commitment is within reach, \$120 a year pays for a student's meal program. Donations can be made online or by check mailed to: Abukloi Foundation, PO Box 2831, Chester VA 23831.

month in the Peaks Postings newsletter which comes out weekly by email. If you would like to be added to the mailing list, you can sign up on the Peaks Presbytery website.

- o We award small grants (\$200-\$400) to churches for earth care ministry 3 times per year. The next deadline is May 1. Grants can support education (eg. help purchase books or curricula), worship (eg. sanctuary appointments for a Season of Creation), facilities (eg. help purchase new LED bulbs or recycling bins) or outreach (eg. start a community garden, sponsor a scholarship to an earth care conference). Be inspired to start something new to care for creation!

- o Creation Justice Ministries [creationjustice.org](https://www.creationjustice.org) has put out a new resource for 2026, entitled Canopy of Creation <https://www.creationjustice.org/canopyofcreation.html>, a year-round tool for creation care and creation justice, that can be used for Earth Day, Arbor Day, Season of Creation, or any time your community is ready to engage. This resource invites us to see trees not just as environmental symbols, but as witnesses to God's presence, instruments of healing, and barometers of our faithfulness to neighbor love.

- o The May meeting of Presbytery will be held at Blacksburg Presbyterian Church, and will showcase creation projects that your congregation can do.

**Racial Equity Subcommittee:** *Who in your congregation's history inspires you?* Can you remember some of your church members in the past who faced challenges? Their faithful actions can inspire us and instruct us as we face the future. Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church is proud of its history of 136 years. Recently, the City of Roanoke installed historical markers that recognized the work of two members of Fifth Avenue Church. Their lives left a legacy of justice and mercy and racial equity.

**Miss Lucy Addison (1861-1937).** Miss Lucy Addison, a pioneering educator who served Black students in Roanoke for 41 years, was born in Fauquier County to enslaved parents. Educated in Philadelphia, she moved to Roanoke in 1886 to teach. She became principal of the Harrison School in 1917 and expanded its curriculum beyond grade eight, creating Roanoke's first four-year Black high school. Accredited in 1925, this was among the largest schools for Black students in Virginia led by a woman. In 1928, Roanoke opened the 19-classroom Lucy Addison High School, the city's first public school named for a resident. In a time of strict segregation, Miss Lucy Addison expanded educational opportunities for Black students and families. Miss Addison was an active member of Fifth Avenue, serving for 27 years as superintendent of the vibrant Sunday School. She also served on the board of Burrell Memorial Hospital. Today the former Lucy Addison High School is now Lucy Addison Aerospace Middle School.

**Dr. Isaac Burrell (1865-1914).** Dr. Burrell, a Roanoke physician and pharmacist, was born in Amelia County to enslaved parents. He graduated in 1888 from Lincoln University in Pennsylvania. He subsequently graduated from the Medical College of Shaw University in Raleigh, NC, and received an M.D. in 1893. Dr. Burrell moved to Roanoke and married Margaret Barnette, a graduate of Hampton Institute (later Hampton University). She was a teacher in the Roanoke public schools. Burrell's medical practice prospered and soon he opened

a drugstore which for many years was the only Black-owned pharmacy in Southwestern Virginia.

Dr. Burrell was an active member of Fifth Avenue Church where he served as an elder. Dr. Burrell also served as president of the Magic City Medical Society, the local organization of African American physicians. Because Black patients were denied admission to the city's White hospitals, the African American doctors of Roanoke had long hoped to build their own hospital. The need for such an institution came into grim focus in 1914 when Dr. Burrell himself became deathly ill. In great pain, Dr. Burrell was placed on a stretcher inside a train's baggage car and made the 220-mile journey by train to Freedman's Hospital in Washington, DC. He was accompanied by his wife and a fellow Black physician. Issac Burrell died in Washington shortly after undergoing surgery for gallstones. Dr. Burrell was 49 years old when he died. His tragic death led four Black physicians to establish a hospital to treat Black patients. Two of these doctors were members of Fifth Avenue Church. They named the new hospital Burrell Memorial Hospital and it became the region's largest medical facility for Black patients.

## REPORT OF THE PERMANENT JUDICIAL COMMISSION

On December 9, 2025, a Negotiated Agreement was reached between the Presbytery of the Peaks and Rev. Dr. Peter Thompson, Senior Pastor/Head of Staff at First Presbyterian Church, Lynchburg, pursuant to the Rules of Discipline of the Book of Order.

The Permanent Judicial Commission convened on February 11, 2026, and voted to accept the Negotiated Agreement as recommended by the Investigating Committee.

### Charges

**Charge #1:** As the pastor of the congregation, Rev. Dr. Peter Thompson did not create and maintain a safe space which includes establishing and maintaining professional boundaries within the educational program of the congregation and in fact is encouraging unsafe spaces and unhealthy relationships within the leadership of the program.

Provisions violated: Book of Order G-2.0102 (Ordered Ministries) and G-3.0201 (Responsibilities of the Session).

**Charge #2:** Rev. Dr. Peter Thompson failed to report the knowledge of harm or risk of harm of children to appropriate authorities within 24 hours.

Provisions violated: Book of Order G-4.0301 (Trust and Confidentiality), G-4.0302 (Mandatory

Reporting), the Child Protection Policy of First PC(USA) in Lynchburg, VA, and the Code of Virginia, Section 63.2-1509.

**Censure: Rebuke with Supervised Rehabilitation**

Within six months of the signing of the Negotiated Agreement, Rev. Dr. Peter Thompson will complete one of the four-day experiences of the Clergy Program of the Davidson Centre for the Professions, at which he will focus on establishing and maintaining healthy professional boundaries as well as creating safe spaces in the congregation.

Rev. Dr. Thompson signed the agreement stating: "I accept the findings of the Investigating Committee and the terms of the recommended censure. While acting in what I believe to be good faith, I have come to see that my conduct was in violation of the Church's policies."

### **Summary of 2025 Actions**

1. Completed a Quit Claim Deed transferring the property of Glen Wilton Presbyterian Church to the Friends of Glen Wilton, Inc. in March 2025.
2. Authorized payment of \$100,000 to Masannetta Springs Camp and Conference Center for their capital campaign. A recommendation for this gift came from the Church Partnership Commission and was approved by the presbytery at the February 2025 meeting.
3. Authorized payment of \$100,000 to Presbyterian Community Center of Roanoke to help complete their new building project. A recommendation for this gift came from the Justice and Mercy Commission and was approved by the presbytery at the June 2025 meeting.
4. Approved an additional \$10,000 be sent to the Presbyterian Community Center in honor and memory of Ms. Helen Dean who was actively involved with the Presbytery and PCC.

5. Contracted with Hill Studio for the Forward in Faith Program working with 4-6 Peaks congregations and not to exceed \$125,000.
6. Approved the request from Amherst Presbyterian Church to sell property owned by the church with funds being placed in an endowment and used for operation of the church.
7. Approved Rev. Don Makin as Interim General Presbyter for Presbytery of the Peaks.
8. Approved the transfer of real property of Hermon Presbyterian Church to the Hermon PC Cemetery Corporation with the requirement that conditional provisions be included in the articles of incorporation for the cemetery corporation ensuring the maintenance of Divine Worship in perpetuity for the life of Hermon PC and all legal due diligence for the conveyance continue to be done faithfully by the Session of HPC.
9. Sold Glasgow Presbyterian Church to the town of Glasgow for \$100,000 in August 2025.
10. Acquired Forest Hills Presbyterian Church through a Quit Claim Deed in October 2025.
